READING FOR LIFE RADIO brings printed matter to life for millions of people throughout the United States with vision or reading disabilities, affording them independence, dignity, and enrichment through the use of innovative technology and dedicated volunteer readers.

Created to continue the nearly 35 year old mission of In Touch Networks which closed its doors this year, **READING FOR LIFE RADIO** volunteers work tirelessly to fill the information void in the lives of the blind, visually impaired and disabled.

Approximately 9.2 million people who have vision loss live in a large metropolitan area

READING FOR LIFE RADIO is the only service of its kind in the New York metropolitan area.

READING FOR LIFE RADIO embraces its mission to expand knowledge, educate, inform and culturally enlighten.

Being uninformed is a serious handicap. It hinders one's ability to make common everyday decisions.

READING FOR LIFE RADIO is dedicated to provide the information needed to alleviate isolation and provide vital social connections to the blind, physically disabled and cognitively disabled Americans it reaches across 28 states.

In a statement before the World Intellectual Property Organization Standing Committee on Copyright and Related Rights (SCCR) a U.S. representative stated...

"Everyone with a visual impairment, physical disability or learning disability has a right to equal access to all forms of information available to the general public. The United States believes profoundly, in the words of our Supreme Court, that copyright law is 'the engine of free expression' and has committed to policies that ensure that everyone has a chance to get the information and education they need to live independently as full citizens in their communities."

Who Are We?

READING FOR LIFE RADIO is a free, closed circuit radio reading service. We provide special receivers to our audience who, because of their disability, cannot read what our volunteers' can see. Our volunteer broadcasters read the content from over 100 newspapers and magazines including The New York Times, The Wall Street Journal, Business Week, Cat Fancy, Dog Fancy, and People.

We broadcast 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

We distribute our programming – free – to individual listeners in the New York City tri-state area, at the patient bedside of more than 60 hospitals and skilled nursing facilities, in assisted living facilities and to listeners in 28 states through more than 50 affiliated stations.

Who Listens?

Any person who is unable to see, hold or comprehend print matter because of a disability may apply to **READING FOR LIFE RADIO** for service.

READING FOR LIFE RADIO serves over 750,000 weekly listeners nationwide. Our audience is as diverse as our population and there are many reasons they have lost their ability to read or hold printed matter. They may lose their sight through age-related macular degeneration, diabetes, or other types of age-related eye diseases. They may have had a stroke, or accident, or are undergoing a medical treatment that leaves them too weak to concentrate. They may have a muscular condition such as cerebral palsy or multiple sclerosis. They may suffer from debilitating arthritis. After a lifetime of reading, the sudden and dramatic loss of being able to independently peruse a newspaper, magazine or book can be devastating.

Who Reads The Programs?

There are more than 150 volunteer readers who devote their time and voices to **READING FOR LIFE RADIO**. They are teachers and students, lawyers and business people. Many of them are professional actors and voice-over artists.

Though you may not know their names, you will certainly recognize their voices, Les Marshak whose voice is heard on NBC's Today Show is a volunteer reader.

And, though not an active reader, you may hear the voice of legendary radio broadcaster Cousin Brucie (Bruce Morrow) who is a long-time supporter and board advisor to READING FOR LIFE RADIO
